MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Church Family,

As I write this, my family and I just returned from vacation in the Smoky Mountains and Asheville, NC. While we were there, we stayed in a cabin overlooking God's beautiful mountains. The scenery was breathtaking. When a thunderstorm rumbled through the slopes, valleys, and mountain tops, the clouds made an alluring and enchanting mist that looked like smoke rising from the trees.

Besides enjoying God's creation, we also visited the popular Biltmore Estate. The mansion was majestic. Never had we seen and experienced such a grand and exquisite place to live! The house itself spanned over four acres! I found myself contemplating how much it must have cost to build such a château. My thoughts then wandered to how much the owner, George Vanderbilt, must have spent on his collections of paintings, library, furniture, and numerous other artifacts. The amount of wealth he inherited and acquired was beyond astronomical.

Then I wondered about George's spiritual wealth. Nothing was mentioned of his beliefs or faith, or if he had any at all. Had he been spiritually wealthy or poor? While living, he had all the material wealth one could imagine. But like the mist that rises among the Smoky Mountains and then dissipates, so did George's wealth. He was born into wealth, but like everyone else, he left with none of it.

James 4:13-14 says, "Come now, you who say, 'Today or tomorrow we will go to such and such a city, and spend a year there and engage in business and make a profit.' Yet you do not know what your life will be like tomorrow. You are just a vapor that appears for a little while and then vanishes away" (NASB). Because our lives are indeed short-lived like mist, we ought to be

thoughtful about our spiritual state and what happens beyond the grave. In fact, for Christians, we are reminded repeatedly to "set your mind on the things above, not on the things that are on earth" (Col. 3:2).

Jesus even had much to say on the topic of focusing upon the heavenly. He taught His disciples to not "store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust destroys, and where thieves do not break in or steal; for where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" (Matt. 6:19-21).

George Vanderbilt stored up much wealth here upon the earth, but how much wealth did he have in heaven? Where was his treasure? As interesting as this question of history may be, the significance for us is to ask ourselves where our treasure is: heaven or earth? The great theologian and pastor, A.W. Tozer in his classic "The Pursuit of God" wrote, "If we truly want to follow God, we must seek to be other-worldly. This I say knowing well that that word has been used with scorn by the sons of this world and applied to the Christian as a badge of reproach. So be it." (p.43).

In a society that consistently pursues and stores up wealth in this world, let us be different. Let us remember to be other-worldly. This world may not understand it and even ridicule it, but as Tozer said, so be it. Our Lord is Jesus, not wealth.





The Folwell Family: 5 Generations of Potters

This exhibition featured Native American pottery from 5 generations of the Folwell family of the Santa Clara Pueblo. It was established around 1550 and is located along the Rio Grande in north-central New Mexico. At Santa Clara, pottery making is passed down from generation to generation, and the potters are famous for their hand-crafted blackware and redware.

We, The People – Portraits of Veterans in America

This exhibition is acclaimed artist Mary Whyte's unprecedented series of stirring portraits of American veterans. Featuring veterans of all ages and in all walks of life, one from each of our fifty states, Whyte's large-scale watercolors have captured the essence of our country's everyday people with courage, empathy, and honor.

Georgia-O'Keeffe, A Life Well Lived

This collection of 48 previously unpublished photographs by Malcolm Varon reveals rarely seen aspects of O'Keeffe's life and personality.
